## Director's Column by Chad Leinaweaver

One of the responsibilities a public library has is finding ways to get involved in the community, and it is one of the things I enjoy the most. It allows me to meet interesting people, find out about new initiatives, and hear about things important to our residents. Coming up this October 12-13 is one of our big collaborative outreach efforts, **The Morristown Festival of Books**. The Library and other downtown institutions host authors to speak about their recent works of fiction and nonfiction for adults as well as for teens and children. It is a great opportunity for book fans to get up close to these authors not only at their talks, but also at the book sales tent throughout the day.

Speaking of festivals, we see a lot of our patrons and friends at the **Morristown Festival on the Green**, which this year will be on September 30 from noon to 5:00. Much of the community comes out for this event which showcases local restaurants, nonprofit organizations and performers on several stages. At the Festival on the Green, the Library turns out in full force (well, almost — the Library is still open for business that day too!) with giveaways and book raffles for children and teens and a lot of information about the myriad of services we offer for all ages. If you are there, stop by our booth to say hello!

Another large collaborative community effort is our work with St. Peter's Episcopal Church, The Presbyterian Church in Morristown, the Mayo Performing Arts Center, Jockey Hollow Bar & Kitchen, and the Residences at Vail Mansion as part of the Morristown Cultural District. We have hosted past programs and fund-raisers to help make our community even better and this year we are planning to make 'shelf sitters' of each of our buildings to sell as a fund-raiser this fall. Are you familiar with those neat little woodblock replicas of historic buildings that exist for everything from the Lincoln Memorial to the Cape May Lighthouse? That is what we are doing with the Library's 1917 façade, so stay tuned for that this fall!

Another of our recent collaborations is with the Morris County Hispanic-American Chamber of Commerce. Our History and Genealogy Center is hoping to document the history of people of Hispanic heritage in Morristown and Morris Township, just like we did with the Irish and African American communities, by undertaking a collecting project as well as conducting oral histories with a variety of residents. The MCHA Chamber of Commerce helped us to connect with various members of the community by collaborating on a program here at the Library in August. At the program we honored Antonio Cardona, a native of Columbia who came to Morristown in 1972 and who turned 100 on August 26. It is not every day that someone turns 100, and it was a great event to share with Mr. Cardona and his family and also for our staff to meet people to help us with our history project.

Sometimes we have valuable collaborations that might fly a little under the radar to most. For many years we have worked with intellectually disabled adults from Daily Plan-It, a Community Options Enterprises nonprofit business on Speedwell Avenue. They help us weekly cleaning up litter on our grounds. They also utilize the computers and resources in our Library for enrichment and have even set up their own yoga class here at the Library with Morristown resident Munah Hayes who runs our free, popular yoga classes for patrons. Daily Plan-It performs a valuable function for which we are grateful. It has been a wonderful working relationship as are many of our collaborations. Working with others is the name of the game at our Library!

## The Children's Room by Arlene Sprague

First access to new books is one of the best parts of a librarian's job. New releases from favorite authors are anticipated and savored. Yet sometimes, regardless of how eagerly awaited, they fail to measure against some of the old classics. This fall take a new approach to reading children's books. Instead of just reading the latest releases, share an old favorite with the child in your life. How many of them watched the animated movie, *Ferdinand*? The movie was cute and entertaining, but it varied from the book. Why not check out *The Story of Ferdinand* by Munro Leaf and compare it to the movie? Both focus on the story of a bull who would rather smell the flowers than fight. *Caps for Sale* by Esphyr Slobodkina is still a good read-aloud. The repetitive story of a peddler who sits down under a tree to take a nap, still encourages audience participation 80 years after its original publication date. *Harry the Dirty Dog* by Gene Zion gives us a dog who hates bath time and runs away. He gets so dirty that his family does not recognize him when he comes home! This book has been pleasing young children for more than half a century. Have a child who loves trucks and cars? Then you should pick up a copy of *Mike Mulligan and his Steam Shovel* by Virginia Lee Burton. Mike Mulligan and his steam shovel Mary Anne work great together as a team but Mary Anne is threatened by modern shovels who can dig faster than the old steam shovel. *Tikki Tikki Tembo* by Arlene Mosel is another crowd pleaser with its tale of two brothers, Tikki Tikki Tembo-no sa Rembo-chari Bari Ruchi-pip Peri Pembo and his brother Chang who have some problems with a well and receive some help from an old man with a ladder. You will be chanting Tikki Tikki Tembo's full name before the end of the story.

For older children try some longer chapter classics. Like *Ferdinand, A Wrinkle in Time* by Madeleine E'Lengle was also made into a movie recently. Follow the adventure as three children cross time and space to rescue Meg's father from evil. Decide which is better — the movie or the book! *Stuart Little* by E. B. White tells the story of a little mouse who finds adventure and faces danger as he searches for a lost friend. *From the Mixed-Up Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiler* by E. L. Konigsburg explores the idea of where would you go if you ran away from home. Claudia and her little brother hide out in the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City. After reading this novel, think about where you would like to hide out from the world and how you would survive there. In *The Phantom Tollbooth* by Norton Juster, readers travel with Milo through a tollbooth to a ridiculous land where Rhyme and Reason are lost. Children today will enjoy Milo's journey as much as children did 50 years ago.

As the seasons start to change, and the temperature starts to drop, come visit the Children's Room and find books from your past that children of today will still enjoy. They just need to know they are there!

## Museum Passes Available

The Library is pleased to announce the launch of our new Museum Pass Program. We are acquiring passes to several museums in New Jersey and New York, including Grounds for Sculpture, the Stickley Museum, the Guggenheim Museum, Brooklyn Botanical Gardens and more! The passes will be free to borrow by Library cardholders over the age of 18. This is a great opportunity for our patrons to visit some of the most popular museums in the local area. We are very excited about this new service and look forward to having the program in full swing very soon. More details to come!

## Willsky Fund Collection by Louis Munoz

Veterans Day, a holiday when we remember and honor all of the men and women who have served in the American Armed Forces, will soon be imminent. Our patrons' deep and passionate interest in our country's military history, and history in general, is reflected in the Library's extensive history section and resources.

One of the reasons the Library has been able to maintain such a great history collection has been due to the generosity of the Willsky family, who created the Max Willsky Fund in honor of their father. A native of Newark and a longtime resident of Morristown, Max Willsky served in World War II as a medical technician and pharmacist. He received several medals for his service, including the American Campaign Medal and the World War II Victory Medal. Because of his deep love of reading and history, in particular reading about World War II, his children created a special collection in his name in 1993. Although Mr. Willsky passed away in 2005, we celebrate 25 years of the Max Willsky History Collection this year thanks to his family's continued generosity. ### Inktober

### NONFICTION by Stephen Brunskill

#### *Run Forever: Your Complete Guide to Healthy Lifetime Running* by Amby Burfoot

Everyone knows how to run — it's naturally wired into your being! Trendy gadgets and obsessive concepts aside, this book boils it down to a simple, intuitive activity. The author shares practical advice (how to motivate yourself, avoid injuries, increase your abilities and goals) but aims for you to run for your own enjoyment with the benefit of better health.

#### *The Black Prince: England's Greatest Medieval Warrior* by Michael Jones

He was Edward of Woodstock, eldest son of Edward III, and the Prince of Wales (1330-1376), but history knows him best as "The Black Prince." At the age of 16, he was given his own suit of armor; his efforts in France marked England's dominance there. But what made this young man into the chivalrous myth he's known for? This exemplary history uses the Prince's own letters and a wide range of documentary material to tell the legend of this English hero, painting a memorable vision of society in tumultuous 14th Century Europe.

#### *The Gutsy Girl Handbook: Your manifesto For Success* by Kate White

Bestselling author, former editor of *Cosmopolitan* magazine and a Gutsy Girl herself, Kate White offers dozens of very achievable career strategies for women in any profession or any stage of their working lives.

#### *Paul Simon: The life* by Robert Hilburn

Armed with complete access to the music legend Paul Simon, acclaimed biographer and music writer Robert Hilburn gleans new insights on the man behind the classic music and offers more information on Simon's compositions to his best known songs.

#### *Being Hindu: Understanding a Peaceful Path in a Violent World* by Hindol Sengupta

Even with one billion Hindus living in the world, many people don't understand or know little about this faith. Answering many questions, this book is a practical guide that takes the reader on a journey to understand some basics — its message, its stance in the midst of world civilizations, and its path for progress and peace in today's multicultural world.

The Library staff are always looking for ways for our patrons to learn new things and a new collection can help with that — our "*Library of Things*!"

The Library of Things collection offers Morristown and Morris Township residents an opportunity to explore a new hobby or try a new activity before purchasing specialized equipment. It is also convenient for borrowing large items patrons otherwise may not have the space to keep at home. Want to try a sewing project or check for buried treasure in and around town? Invite friends over for an outdoor film screening, challenge your family to Frisbee golf in the back yard, or study the planets and constellations through a telescope? Now you can borrow the gear to do these things and more!

We obtained a selection of "Things" for patrons to borrow and we hope to build upon it in the future. The Library now has a telescope, a ukulele, binoculars, a mobile LED movie projector, a metal detector, a digital microscope and a Frisbee golf set.

Patrons can borrow an entire "Thing" kit to try out for themselves: a device, any accessories and instructions all within a portable bag. Kits can be borrowed for 14 days, but are not renewable and must be returned inside the Library, not placed in the book drop.

To check out any of these cool new "Things" just visit the Circulation Desk, pick up something to expand your learning and return it within 14 days. Our staff can provide any additional details and instructions. Discover a new hobby with our "Library of Things!"



### Pattern Books: Printed Precedents in American Architecture

Books, serial publications, and advertisements play an outsize role in the transmission of architectural ideas and innovations in America. Since the first Georgian-inspired houses of the 18th century appeared in colonial settlements, Americans have been using printed sources. Often grafted onto deeper traditional building practice and locally available materials, the result is a creative and distinct architecture that influenced housing, civic buildings, and religious buildings up to the Second World War. Join us as Morris County resident the noted architectural historian and teacher Janet W. Foster explores the role of pattern books, particularly in New Jersey's buildings.

### Sri Lanka: An Uncommon Destination

Join us as we relive a 16-day wildlife expedition in Sri Lanka along with cultural side trips which made for a revealing experience. Explore some of the 115 species of birds and passel of mammals including leopards, elephants, water buffalo, sambar and spotted deer, langur and toque macaque monkeys encountered in the wild of the forests. Visit archeological sites dating back to 100 BC. Discover two special Sri Lankan dishes: "egg hoppers" (an egg cooked in a thin hemispherical crepe) and "curd and treacle" (curd made from water buffalo milk and treacle, a product of the processing of raw sugar). Local resident and adventure traveler **Mark Rochkind** introduces this very welcoming country which has a unique and interesting history.

**Mark Rochkind** is a graduate of NYC's Stuyvesant High School, the University of Rochester, and Cal Berkeley where he earned a PhD in Chemistry. He was a research scientist and technical manager at Bell Laboratories and an R&D Executive at Philips Electronics and AT&T. For six years Mark served as a publicly elected member of the Bernards Township Board of Education. He was President of the Louis August Jonas Foundation (2004-2010). In 2005, Mark and his wife Pat created the Rochkind Wagner Foundation, active principally in education. He is a member of the Morristown & Township Library Finance Committee and a trustee of the Morristown & Township Library Foundation. Mark rides a Vespa, enjoys wine, opera, birds and travel. He also maintains a passion for single malt scotch.

### Discovery of A Masterpiece: A "lost" Rodin in Madison, NJ

Sometimes a lost masterpiece is sitting right next to you hiding in plain sight! Local educator, part-time archivist and art sleuth Mallory Mortillaro will share a fascinating story about how she discovered a priceless Rodin sculpture in the Council Chambers of Madison, New Jersey's town hall. Getting the world to recognize that it was a true work by Rodin was a whole other story....!



### Japan and Its Prints in the Floating World

**Featuring print enthusiast/collector Tom Silver**


Join us for an illustrated discussion of Japanese prints during the Edo period (1600-1867). The first rudimentary prints during this period focused on portraits of courtesans and kabuki actors, with the genre ultimately developing into the sophisticated art form admired by the likes of Western artists such as Monet and Van Gogh. The period encompasses many of the most familiar names in Japanese prints, including Utamaro, Hokusai, and Hiroshige. The presentation will focus on early period prints and then examine masterpieces by each of these artists. At the conclusion of the lecture, there will be a display of Japanese crafts from the last two centuries as well as prints from Tom Silver's own collection.

**Tom Silver** developed an interest in Japanese art while searching for an unusual gift for his wife. That search sparked a love for Japan's art, history, and culture. Mr. Silver's talks at libraries and other institutions showcase print masterpieces from the 350-year history of the Japanese print genre. He is a New Jersey native with degrees from Drew University and Rutgers University.

**The Beatles & George Martin**



Join us for a very special author event by Kenneth Womack whose new book **Sound Pictures: The Life of Beatles Producer George Martin, The Later Years 1966-2016** is the second volume of the first full-length biography of George Martin. Womack provides a detailed account of Martin's collaborative work with The Fab Four as they advanced beyond the success of their earlier recordings. Readers will discover how Martin helped the

bandmates grow as musicians and found the transformative sound that the Beatles are known for today.



**Dr. Kenneth Womack** is Dean of the Wayne D. McMurray School of Humanities and Social Sciences at Monmouth University, where he also serves as Professor of English. He is the author or editor of more than 30 books including **Maximum volume: the Life of Beatles Producer George Martin, the Early Years, 1926-1966, The Cambridge Companion to the Beatles** and **The Beatles Encyclopedia: Everything Fab Four**. A regular Beatles blogger for CultureSonar, Dr. Womack delivers some 50 invited Beatles talks a year to audiences around the world, while sharing his insights on National Public Radio, ABC, CBS, NBC, and the BBC among others.
