Libraries have long been considered 'warehouses of information' or 'treasure troves of knowledge,' but did you ever think of them as 'centers for entertainment?' While not the classic stereotype of a library, it is certainly true and shows up in many ways through the services we offer. So when you are done reading that book on particle physics [Dewey number 539.72 for those of you keeping score at home] or looking up business

information in our Small Business Builder databases, take a break to be entertained!

First and foremost, the Library hosts all sorts of entertainment in our building and this spring is no exception. On Sunday March 31, we will host veteran actress Ellen Barry for "The Infinite Variety of Shakespeare's Women," and be taken on a journey of the wide range of the Bard's female characters. On Friday April 5, Savoy Faire of the Light Opera of New Jersey will perform selections from the Pirates of Penzance, one of Gilbert and Sullivan's most famous musicals. They performed portions of The Mikado last year and were so wonderful we asked them back! On Friday May 10, the Harmonium Choral Society's Chorus section will perform at the Library. The famous Harmonium Society regularly performs at Grace Episcopal Church in Madison and at local holiday concerts. The Harmonium's Chorus is thrilled to entertain our Library patrons. Don't miss it!

Some of the most popular forms of entertainment are television shows and movies. Did you know that we offer those in various formats? We have shelves of DVDs and Blue-rays in our Media Department for you to browse. Have you always wanted to see those old episodes of *Columbo* or *The Avengers*? We have 'em! Would you love to binge watch a newer series such as *The Americans* or *Modern Family*? We also have those! Not a cable-TV subscriber and missed *Game of Thrones*? We have that too! As for movies, we carry a wide range in our collection including classic, foreign and independent films that don't show up on Netflix or Amazon Prime. Streaming services change their offerings each month so may no longer offer a films such as *The Wizard of Oz* or *The Breakfast Club* for free. But our DVD and Blu-ray titles are always free!

Streaming videos through your TV or mobile device is a popular way to watch movies or television shows, especially when you finally have time to relax and no idea what to watch! Kanopy, a new product at the Library, can help with that — it provides streaming of all sorts of movies to your Roku box, Amazon fire stick or even your phone simply by using your library card! The service has become really popular for our patrons and Kanopy is known for having great documentaries, independent films and classic older movies. Another entertaining new service that our Library offers are passes to area New Jersey and New York City museums and cultural institutions. Museum passes can be checked out from our Circulation Department and are very popular. Our passes include the Brooklyn Botanic Garden, Craftsman Farms, the Guggenheim Museum and many others for you to visit. Passes can be borrowed for a three-day loan period and are found in our Library catalog — just search "museum pass" to see what is available when you want to go, or call us at 973-538-6161.

Certainly reading fiction books is also 'entertainment' — right? Our Reader's Advisors on the second floor can suggest some new titles to read if you just want to connect with that 'next great book.' Also our Reader's Advisors run our monthly book clubs and 'Book Lovers Circle' for you to discover lots of new authors. Whether you are looking to be entertained by a great book, a cool new TV show, or the latest music CD by a favorite band, our staff knows great titles for you to try. #### The CHILDREN'S ROOM by Arlene Sprague

Looking for some new books to read this spring? Try some of the award-winning books announced by the American Library Association. For almost 100 years the American Library Association has given annual awards to the



authors and illustrators they consider the best of the year. Once again, librarians from all over the US gathered, voted and made their selections. The John Newbery Medal for the most outstanding contribution to children's literature went to Meg Medina for her book *Merci Suarez Changes Gears*. Merci is facing changes as she enters sixth-grade. As a scholarship student, she always felt different than her classmates, but she never thought that other girls could be jealous of her. At home, her grandfather's closest friend begins forgetting simple things and is angry all the time. Worse, no one will tell Merci what is going on. She has to find a way to take care of herself since she feels alone at school and home. Through Merci, Ms. Medina shows the changes that happen during middle school, but counters these with the permanent bonds of family.

The Randolph Caldecott Medal for the most distinguished American picture book for children went to Sophie Blackall who wrote and illustrated *Hello Lighthouse*. In describing her book, Sophie Blackall said "I wanted to tell a story about the life of a single family living in a very specific and magical place, with universal experiences of separation and reunion, birth and growth, drama and peril, change and loss, hope and renewal." *Hello Lighthouse* explores the life of one lighthouse through shifting seasons, changeable weather, and the tenure of its final keeper. This was Ms. Blackall's second Caldecott award in three years! She previously won for her illustrations in *Finding Winnie: the True Story of the World's Most Famous Bear* by Lindsay Mattick.

While these award winners have been available for months, some new books by favorite authors are due to be released this spring. Mo Willems, the author of the *Pigeon* and the *Elephant and Piggie* series, will be releasing *Because*, which focuses on a child's discovery of her passion for music and her journey to make music her life's work. Adam Rubin, the author of *Dragons Love Tacos*, has a new title, *High Five*, being published this spring. Publisher's Weekly describes *High Five* as "an interactive picture book that invites readers to hone their hand slapping skills." Fans of Kwame Alexander, a past Newbery winner, will want to read his new book, *The Undefeated*. Using poetry, Alexander tells the history of African Americans and the perseverance of people who refused to be defeated.

Whether you choose to read recent award-winners, previous years medalists or new releases from favorite authors, there is always something worth reading in the Children's Room!

Are you 55<sup>+</sup> with a vision change? There is software to help you see AND hear the computer! In this 4-week beginner class, you will learn basic computer terminology, and basic mouse and keyboarding skills as well as how to navigate your computer. You will receive an introduction to the software available on these computers to help you see and hear the computer. This program is part of the Library Equal Access Program (LEAP) for NJ residents 55<sup>+</sup> who have experienced a change in vision. The Commission supports free iPad and computer training classes through Advancing Opportunities.

With impressive illustrations and portraits, Worsley recreates 24 of the most important days in Queen Victoria's life, exploring her myriad roles in an extraordinary time of change and political resistance.

#### In This Together: How Successful Women Support Each Other In Work and Life by Nancy D. O'Reilly, PsyD.

Psychologist O'Reilly shares advice from authors, actresses, CEOs and professors in this collection of thoughts, advice, and stories of all sorts of successful women, encouraging women to support each other in the workplace and in life.

#### FICTION by Susan Lipstein

Kingdom of the Blind by Louise Penny

The 14th in the beloved Inspector Gamache series, Gamache has been named one of the executors of a will filed by a woman he has never met. He nearly meets an untimely death because of his executor position — and then the dead body of one of the woman's sons shows up. Gamache has to put the pieces of this puzzle together while clearing his name as he is being investigated due to past decisions he made concerning drugs and drug smugglers. Lives are in the balance no matter what. The book is as well-written as the others in the series, and it's good to be back in Three Pines again!

#### Nine Perfect Strangers by Liane Moriarty

Nine guests meet at a wellness retreat located in the middle of nowhere, Australia. It is run by a woman who turns out to have more than a few radical ideas about wellness and some extremely unorthodox techniques. It's full of surprises and slyly funny. Like Moriarty's other novels, it is full of intriguing characters having trouble coping with modern life.

#### The Other Woman by Sandie Jones

Emily has met the perfect man and is eagerly planning to marry him. But she soon finds that there is another woman in Adam's life, someone who does not seem to share her plans and seems to be stopping at nothing to keep the two of them from marrying. She just happens to be Adam's mother, Emily's future mother-in-law. Emily is determined to outsmart her, but soon begins to feel that Adam's mother will stop at nothing to prevent the marriage. This is indeed the mother-in-law-from-hell book, but with some surprising twists. See if you can figure them out ahead of time.

#### LARGE-PRINT by Louis Muñoz Jr.

The Huntress by Kate Quinn

From the author of the bestselling novel, *The Alice Network*, comes another fascinating historical novel about a battle-haunted English journalist and a Russian female bomber pilot who join forces to track the Huntress, a Nazi war criminal gone to ground in America.

#### Fly Girls: How Five Daring Women Defied All Odds and Made Aviation History by Keith O'Brien

The untold story of five women who fought to compete against men in the high-stakes national air races of the 1920s and 1930s — and won. Like *Hidden Figures* and *Girls of Atomic City*, *Fly Girls* celebrates a little-known slice of history in which tenacious, trail-blazing women braved all obstacles to achieve greatness.

The Great Believers by Rebecca Makkai A dazzling new novel of friendship and redemption in the face of tragedy and loss set in 1980s Chicago and contemporary Paris, by the acclaimed and award-winning author Rebecca Makkai.

#### Resistance Women

by Jennifer Chiaverini

From the bestselling author of *Mrs. Lincoln's Dressmaker*, an enthralling historical saga that recreates the danger, romance, and sacrifice of an era and brings to life one courageous, passionate American — Mildred Fish Harnack — and her circle of women friends who waged a clandestine battle against Hitler in Nazi Berlin.

We are pleased to announce our new *Museum Pass Program*. We now offer museum passes to 11 area institutions: *Acorn Hall, Brooklyn Botanic Garden, The City of New York Museum,* 

Craftsman Farms/Stickley Museum, Grounds for Sculpture, The Guggenheim, Morris Museum, Newark Museum, Cooper Gristmill, Fosterfields, and Historic Speedwell.

The passes are free to borrow by Library resident cardholders over the age of 18. One museum pass at a time may be checked out on a Library card for a 3-day loan period. Borrowers are urged to return the pass as soon as possible after using, so the pass will be available to others. 

Rich Rosenthal, president of the North Jersey Civil War Round Table and a founding member of the North Jersey American Revolution Round Table, along with pre-eminent NJ historian John T. Cunningham, has lectured on numerous historical subjects. He will tell stories of wartime survival, not from cannons and bullets, but from life itself. Meet, among others, New Jersey's Cornelia Hancock, who defiantly goes to Gettysburg after being rejected as a nurse for being too pretty, and Mary Ann Bickerdyke, who sets up hospitals and kitchens, and follows General Sherman through the mountains of Georgia.

# AUTHOR TALK: Mark Di Ionno, Author of "Gods of Wood and Stone" March 26, 7:00 PM, Meeting Room

Award-winning newspaper columnist Mark Di Ionno will discuss his latest novel, *Gods of Wood and Stone*. This is an introspective, intrinsically American novel about two men from disparate worlds set on an explosive collision course culminating at the annual Hall of Fame Induction ceremony in Cooperstown, NY. In this searing exploration of honor and masculinity, sports and celebrity, marriage and parenting, such timeless themes as the responsibilities of manhood and the pitfalls of glory are viewed through the lens of baseball — and its outsized influence on a small town and the people in it.

**Mark Di Ionno** is a popular columnist for the *Newark Star-Ledger* as well as a novelist. A Pulitzer Prize finalist, he began his career as a sportswriter for the *NY Post*. The father of six children, he lives in NJ where he teaches journalism at Rutgers University.

In Shakespeare's plays, women are far outnumbered by men, yet they are among his most compelling characters. Veteran actress Ellen Barry will take you on a memorable journey as she performs and discusses a wide range of the Bard's

female characters, from ingénues to leading ladies to character women and finally crones. She will share memories of her own experiences as a leading lady in Shakespeare plays.

There will be a brief Q\(^{\partial}\) A period followed by refreshments upstairs in the F. M. Kirby Gallery to coincide with the reception for photographer Jim Delgiudice's, "A Small Thing But My Own."



**Ellen Barry** has played more than 100 classic and contemporary roles in NY and regional theatres across the country. In addition to Shakespeare's Juliet, Kate Percy, Hermione and Constance, she has won acclaim for her performances as Tennessee Williams' Blanche, Stella, Laura and Hannah; Martha in **Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?**, and both Lorraine and Meg in Sam Shepard's **A Lie of the Mind**. For Ella in

Ibsen's **John Gabriel Borkman**, she received an Off-Off Broadway Award, and for Vivian Bearing in **Wit**, she received a Michigan Best Leading Actress award from the **Detroit Free Press**. Ellen and her late husband, Paul Barry, founded the NJ Shakespeare Festival (now Shakespeare Theatre of NJ). During their 27-year tenures as Producing and Artistic Directors, respectively, all 38 of Shakespeare's plays were offered, as well as works by a variety of other others from Sophocles to Shepard.
