Last year was a busy one for the Friends, and we are happy to say that patrons of the Library were very generous with their time and donations. We also have a dedicated group of volunteers who assist the board members with weekly sales and with pricing and shelving.

February is the time that members of the Friends renew their commitment to the Library. Letters have been sent to all current members as a reminder. It's also a time when we encourage all patrons to consider becoming a Friend. Applications can be picked up at the Circulation Desk or obtained at any Tuesday or Saturday sale, or on page 4 of this newsletter and at the Library's website under the 'Friends' tab. Joining the Friends does not require volunteering at the Library, but we are always happy to welcome new volunteers.

During the month of February, a group of books including those about U.S. Presidents, women's and relationship issues are being offered at half of the marked price. Each month features different groups for you to choose from. Please come and check this out!

We also offer a large selection of young children's, middle readers and young adult books. An additional location on the second floor has more children's books in the Children's Department.

The Friends' weekly used book sales continue to be held from 10 AM to 2 PM every Tuesday all year long, and the first and third Saturdays of the month from September through June. Saturday sales have now been expanded into two locations within the Library. In addition to the Bookworm Room, which is accessible through the Reference Department, the Meeting Room on the lower level will be stocked with carts and tables with many genres. We can only continue to do this work that we love if you donate your unwanted books that are in good condition. We take most genres except textbooks, magazines, and small paperbacks. We also encourage you to donate your unwanted CD's and DVD's as well as books on CDs. The proceeds are passed on to the Library and fund many of the programs that are so popular with our patrons.

The CHILDREN'S ROOM

The Oscars, the Grammys, the Emmys, the Tonys, the Caldecotts, and the Newberys! While most are familiar with the first four, the

American Library Association awards the last two, recognizing the best illustrators and authors of children's literature. Every year, teachers, librarians, and children's book fans create mock committees to try and guess the winners in anticipation of the ALA's medal announcements. Books winning the award see a dramatic increase in sales, often increasing by a thousand percent.


This year, Vashti Harrison, and her book *Big*, took the Caldecott honor for the artist of the most distinguished American picture book for children. Harrison not only illustrated the book, but also wrote the text. *Big* follows a little girl as the meaning of the word big changes during her childhood. At



first, she is praised for acting big, but then as she grows, big becomes a negative term until she learns to be comfortable with who she is. As stated by Kathie Meizner, the Caldecott Medal Committee Chair, "Harrison's use of color and space throughout the book masterfully conveys emotions as a young girl struggles to free herself from the confines of damaging words." Vashti Harrison is the first Black woman to win the Caldecott in its 86-year history.

Pulitzer Prize finalist Dave Eggers and his book *The Eyes and The Impossible*, won the Newbery Medal given

for the most distinguished American Children's book published the previous year. Johannes is a free dog who lives in a park. His job is to be the Eyes, watching for everything that happens within the park, and report his observations back to the park's elders, three ancient Bison. With the help of his friends, a seagull, a raccoon,



a squirrel and a pelican, they make sure The Equilibrium is in balance. But changes are coming to the park, along with a shocking revelation that changes Johannes's view of the world. According to Amber Creger, Newbery Medal Committee Chair "Eggers puts us inside the mind of Johannes... *The Eyes and The Impossible* is a captivating read that is full of joy."

You can find both books in our Children's Room along with the winners from previous years. Decades of quality children's titles are available for perusal. Stop in to check them out. Take home a craft kit or stay for one of our many story times. We currently offer sessions for children ages 2–8 on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings at 10:00 AM and Saturday mornings at 11:00 AM. If you have a child under two, we just started a baby song and story time that runs on alternate Mondays at 10:30 AM. All story times will meet through May. So, come and listen to a story or come and borrow a few to read at home.

ON THE SHELF

FICTION by Louis Muñoz Jr.

Fourteen Days: A Collaborative Novel
Edited by Margaret Atwood and Douglas
Preston

Set in a Lower East Side tenement in the early days of the Covid-19 lockdowns, *Fourteen Days* is an irresistibly propulsive novel with an unusual twist: each character in this diverse, eccentric cast of NYC neighbors has been secretly written by a different, major literary voice, ranging from editors Atwood and Preston to many other voices including Louise Erdrich, Neil Gaiman, Diana Gabaldon, Tommy Orange, Meg Woltizer, R.L. Stine, Scott Turow and Celeste Ng.

Table for Two: Fictions by Amor Towles Amor Towles latest features six short stories and a novella. The stories, most of which are set around the year 2000, range from the death-defying acrobatics of the male ego, to the fateful consequences of brief encounters, and the delicate mechanics of modern marriages. Told from seven points of view, the novella describes how a young woman crafts a new future for herself and others in the midst of Hollywood's 1930s golden age. Throughout all of the stories, two characters often find themselves sitting across a table for two where the direction of their futures may hinge upon what they say to each other next.

After Annie by Anna Quindlen

When Annie Brown dies suddenly, her husband, four young children and closest friend are left to struggle without the woman who centered their lives. Yet over the course of the next year, while Annie looms large in their memories, all of them are able to grow, change, and become stronger and more sure of themselves. The enduring power Annie gave to those who loved her is the power to love, and to go on without her. This is a story that ends with hope, a beautiful novel about how adversity can change us in profound ways.

Diva by Daisy Goodwin

Daisy Goodwin (*The American Heiress*) returns with a story of the scandalous love affair between Maria Callas, the most celebrated opera singer of all time, and Aristotle Onassis, one of the richest men in the world. He introduced her to a life of luxury, showering her with jewels and sojourns in the most fashionable places with celebrities and royalty. This world crashed when it was announced that Onassis would marry former First Lady Jacqueline Kennedy, leaving Maria to pick up the pieces. But it was only in confronting heartbreak that Maria Callas found her true voice and went on to triumph.

Kinfolk by Sean Dietrich

Jeremiah Lewis "Nub" Taylor has spent his whole life listening to those he loves tell him he's no good — first his ex-wife, now his disapproving daughter. Sure, his escapades have made him and his cousin and perennial sidekick, Benny, just a smidge too familiar with small-town law enforcement, but he's never harmed anyone — except perhaps himself. He never meant to change, but when he and 15-year-old waitress Minnie form an unlikely friendship, he realizes for the first time that there may be some good in him after all, and gradually realizes he's been given a second chance to make a difference.

Las Madres by Esmeralda Santiago

From the best-selling author of *When I Was Puerto Rican* comes this powerful novel of family, race, faith, sex, and disaster that moves between Puerto Rico and the Bronx, revealing the lives and loves of five women and the secret that binds. They refer to themselves as "las Madres," a close-knit group of women who, with their daughters, have created a family based on friendship and blood ties. Their story begins in 1975 and continues into 2017, when two back-to-back hurricanes rock their worlds.

The Truth About the Devlins by Lisa Scottoline

TJ Devlin is the disappointment in his prominent family, all of whom are lawyers at their highly successful firm — except him. After stints in prison and rehab, TJ can't get hired anywhere except at the firm, in a make-work job with the title of investigator. TJ's world turns upside down after his older brother John confesses that he murdered one of the clients, an accountant he'd confronted with proof of embezzlement. It seems impossible coming from John, the firstborn and Most Valuable Devlin. TJ plunges into the investigation, seizing the chance to prove his worth and save his brother. But in no time, they find themselves entangled in a lethal web of deception and murder. TJ will fight to save his family, but what he learns might break them first.

NONFICTION by Stephen Brunskill

Unshrinking: How to Face Fatphobia by Kate Manne

Intimate stories are presented here with the analysis that has become the signature of this Cornell University professor author. She proposes that our bodies — no matter what shape they are — exist in the world for ourselves and no one else.

Renters' Rights edited 2024 by Nolo Publishing

Landlord abuse could happen to you. Updated to reflect changes to state laws, this book covers federal antidiscrimination laws and includes advice on how to deal with corporate landlords and property managers too. Great for both landlords and tenants.

Making It in America: The Almost Impossible Quest to Manufacture in the U.S.A. (And How It Got That Way) by Rachel Slade

A moving story that shares how manufacturing developed in the US, and explores whether outsourced means of production can ever successfully return to our shores.

A Critical Introduction to Tarot: Examining the Nature of a Belief in Tarot by Simon Kenny

This is not a "pick up the cards and read them" book. Here, independent researcher Simon Kenny presents Tarot to the curious reader and those who wish to know more about this amazing mystical art.

The Washington Association at 150 (1874-2024)

The staff of the Caroline Rose Foster North Jersey History and Genealogy Center, with the assistance of the Washington Association of New Jersey's archivist, Linda Forgosh and others, designed an exhibit celebrating 150 years of the Washington Association of NJ, a not-for-profit organization that saved the Ford Mansion (AKA Washington's Headquarters) from being demolished when it was bought at an auction in 1873. The Washington Association of NJ raises money to continue to preserve the important landmark and promote the study of George Washington and the Revolutionary War in Morristown and Morris County. The exhibit will be on display in the F.M. Kirby Gallery on the Library's second floor through August 2024.
